

#### Dear Friends,

This is the first bulletin article that I am writing for both St. Maria Goretti and St. Joseph. While last week I wrote something for each of the two bulletins, starting this week I will write the same message for both parishes. This is not only a practical decision on my part since I only have so much time each week to try to complete all the tasks required to pastor both parishes. It is also a pastoral decision since I want to offer a common written message to all the members of both parishes every week, even if I can't be at all the Masses at both parishes.

As the people of St. Maria Goretti have experienced for the past two-and-a-half years, my focus in these articles tends to be the readings we hear proclaimed at Mass. I try to offer some reflections on how the Word proclaimed is meant to shape and guide our hearts, minds, and imaginations as we seek to follow the Lord. But, as much as I appreciate the opportunity to write to all of you, what I write is not the most important part of the bulletin. That distinction is reserved for the weekly *lectio divina* for the upcoming Sunday Gospel that is now included in both bulletins.

Why do I think that the *lectio divina* is the most important part of the bulletin? It's because the *lectio divina* is a wonderful way for us to prepare to receive the Word of God when we gather to celebrate the Holy Eucharist on Sunday. As much as we need to know about the upcoming events in our parish and other important information, it is only by grounding ourselves and our activities in the Word of God that it becomes possible for us to be attentive and responsive to God's voice as he invites us to live as his beloved sons and daughters.

That was certainly the case in the life of Jesus, as we hear in this Sunday's Gospel for the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. St. Luke gives us a beautiful account of that important event in the life of Jesus. The evangelist sets the scene by telling us of the expectation that the people at the time had as John the Baptist preached a baptism of repentance. Luke then tells us about Jesus' baptism experience, with the dramatic details about the heavens being opened, the Holy Spirit descending on Jesus in the form of a dove, and the voice from heaven calling out, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." How important it must have been for Jesus to hear that voice proclaim his fundamental identity as the Son of God! That call must have grounded and shaped everything he did during his public ministry, culminating in his surrender of his life to his Father on the cross. I don't think it's a coincidence that St. Luke records Jesus' last words before his death as, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Even in that moment of supreme suffering and loss, he still knew himself to be God's beloved Son.

You and I were baptized into Christ Jesus, and, thanks to him, we share in his identity as beloved children of our heavenly Father. On the day that we were baptized, God made the same proclamation over us that he made over Jesus, calling us his beloved. But the challenges and distractions of life, both internal and external, can cause us to forget or to deny this fundamental identity. That is why we need to be constantly grounding ourselves on the voice of God, which we hear in a privileged way through the solemn proclamation of God's Word at Mass. Listening to that Word together, Sunday after Sunday, forms us and empowers us to live us God's beloved sons and daughters in Christ. Praying with that Word before Mass, whether by ourselves, with our spouse or a friend, or in a group, helps us prepare to receive and respond to that Word.

That is why I want to encourage you to take the time, each week, to prayerfully ponder the Gospel for the upcoming Sunday, using the *lectio divina* guide in the bulletin or another resource you may know. My hope is that, as we develop the practice of attuning ourselves to the voice of God spoken to us through the Gospel, we will become more attuned to the voice of God speaking to us in and through the many relationships and experiences of our lives.

### Lectio Divina for the Second Week in Ordinary Time

*We begin our prayer:* In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Almighty ever-living God, who govern all things, both in heaven and on earth, mercifully hear the pleading of your people and bestow your peace on our times. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

(Collect, Second Sunday in Ordinary Time)

## **Reading (Lectio)**

Read the following Scripture two or three times. John 2:1-11

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told the them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from — although the servers who had drawn the water knew —, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.

## **Meditation (Meditatio)**

After the reading, take some time to reflect in silence on one or more of the following questions:

- What word or words in this passage caught your attention?
- What in this passage comforted you?
- What in this passage challenged you?

If practicing lectio divina as a family or in a group, after the reflection time, invite the participants to share their responses:

## **Prayer (Oratio)**

*Read the Scripture passage one more time. Bring to the Lord the praise, petition* 

# **Contemplation (Contemplatio)**

Read the Scripture again, followed by this reflection:

What conversion of mind, heart, and life is the Lord asking of me?

Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. Into what parts of my life do I need to invite Jesus? How can I invite others to encounter Jesus?

*Woman, how does your concern affect me?* When have I failed to attend to the concerns of others? For what concerns do I need to pray?

*Do whatever he tells you.* What is God calling me to do? How can I become more docile to God's will?

*After a period of silent reflection and/or discussion, all recite the Lord's Prayer and the following:* 

# **Closing Prayer:**

Sing to the LORD a new song;

sing to the LORD, all you lands.

Sing to the LORD; bless his name.

Announce his salvation, day after day.

Tell his glory among the nations;

among all peoples, his wondrous deeds.

Give to the LORD, you families of nations,

give to the LORD glory and praise;

give to the LORD the glory due his name!

Worship the LORD in holy attire.

Tremble before him, all the earth;

Say among the nations: The LORD is king.

He governs the peoples with equity.
